




### Health Center COVID-19 Vaccine Program Overview

- Established in February 2021 to ensure equitable access to COVID-19 vaccines
- Separate federal allocation deployed in coordination with state and local jurisdictions
- HRSA and CDC partnered to directly allocate COVID-19 vaccine to health centers across the nation




## Health Center COVID-19 Vaccine Accomplishments

A total of 14,639,474 COVID-19 vaccine doses have been administered by health centers to date.

#### **HC Vaccine Program**

- 865 HCs/LALs participating in the HC Vaccine Program
- 6,389,574 COVID-19 vaccine doses administered
- 75% to racial and/or ethnic minorities
- 37% to Special Populations and patients with LEP
- 524,866 COVID-19 vaccine doses administered to adolescents

#### **CDC Recommendations for Pfizer-BioNTech Boosters**

# 6 months after Pfizer-BioNTech primary series the following individuals are eligible for boosters:

- People 65 years and older and residents in long-term care settings should receive a booster
- People aged 50–64 years with underlying medical conditions should receive a booster
- People aged 18–49 years with <u>underlying medical conditions</u> may receive a booster based on their individual benefits and risks, and
- People aged 18–64 years who are at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission because of occupational or institutional setting may receive a booster based on their individual benefits and risks





#### Additional Booster Considerations from CDC

- ACIP and CDC's recommendations only applies to select populations who received the Pfizer vaccine
- People in the recommended age groups who received the Moderna or J&J/Janssen vaccine will likely need a booster shot
- Moderately to severely immunocompromised individuals who are eligible for an additional dose of an mRNA vaccine should get that dose at least 28 days after the completion of their primary series
- CDC and ACIP will continue to follow the science, and evidence will inform decision-making about booster shot recommendations

#### **COVID-19 Vaccine Booster Planning Checklist**

This document is a resource for health centers to assess their readiness to administer COVID-19 booster shots. A booster shot refers to a vaccine given to someone who built enough protection after completing an initial series of vaccinations, but that protection decreased over time. COVID-19 booster shots will be given to individuals in accordance with all requirements and recommendations from FDA, CDC, and the CDC Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP).

- Remain aware of changes to Health Center COVID-19 Vaccine Program and/or jurisdictional immunization reporting requirements. - Prepare data collection systems to support new requirements, including but not limited to: new codes for billing and payments, survey reporting, and tracking vaccine types and doses
- Ensure you have a process to verify that patients receive the right vaccine type and dose, especially if the patient does not have a vaccination card.
- Ensure patient reminder and scheduling systems are up-to-date and have the capacity to handle increases in user traffic.



#### **Pediatric Immunizations**



- In preparation for the eventual approval of the COVID-19 vaccine for children, this is a reminder to administer missed vaccines and other immunizations, including the flu shot, to your adolescent and child patients.
- Administering those shots in advance of the COVID vaccine will reduce the number of shots to be given at the same time as the COVID vaccine.






# **COVID-19 Monoclonal Antibody (mAb) Therapy**

**525 health centers** provided patients with access to monoclonal antibody (mAb) therapy, either directly or through referrals.

- 60 health centers administered 2,660 mAb doses directly to patients.
- Challenges in providing access to mAb therapy:
  - 1. Therapy administration/onsite logistics
  - 2. Staffing capacity
  - 3. Access to therapeutics
