
EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

FOR RESIDENTS OF PUBLIC HOUSING

Data indicates that residents of public housing are likely to experience more adverse effects during emergencies. Here is why:



You can help protect your household and your community by following these emergency preparedness steps:

Make sure you have:



batteries



A working set of A week-long supply of prescription medications



A working flashlight



A written evacuation plan



A 3-day supply of food and water

OTHER STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO INCREASE RESILIENCE:


Ask your local Health Center and Housing Authority about local emergency preparedness resources you should be aware of.
